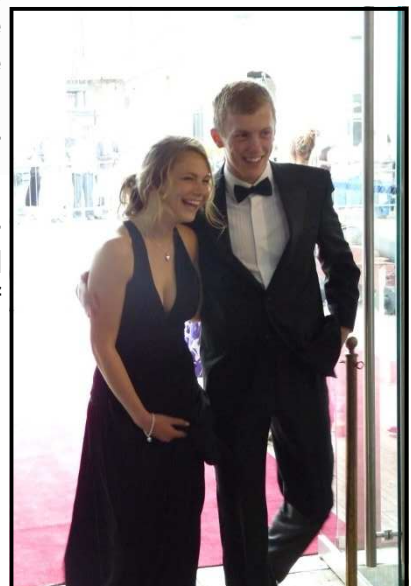

We are delighted to announce that our full school uniform is now available in the new Skoolkit shop in Market Parade, Havant. For your convenience you will be able

They even offer an online shop for those who prefer to shop from home and the order is delivered by post to your home. They are also sourcing a cotton-mix jumper for us. We have a significant number of students from the Portchester/Fareham areas and parents will be pleased to know that Skoolkit now stock our uniform in their Fareham branch also (23 Trinity Street). We hope parents will find this new arrangement much easier.

Some pre-shopping reminders:

Blazers – remember that the blazer is a compulsory school garment and must be worn to and from school. Please ensure your son/daughter is wearing it when they leave the house (and it is not rolled up in their school bag!).

Skirts – we face an ever-present battle with our female students regarding the length of their skirts. Many girls roll up their waistbands and this results in skirt lengths which are not appropriate for a mixed learning environment. Please help us to help you – check the waistband before the girls leave home.

Shoes – students are required to wear black flat proper shoes; girls heels should be no more than two inches. There has been a recent fashion of boys wearing black plimsolls – this is not acceptable and contravenes the uniform regulations.

Nearly New Uniform — The OPA are very keen to re-open their Nearly New Uniform service – but they need stock! If your son/daughter has outgrown their uniform, we would be very pleased if you would donate any items which are in good condition. The Nearly New Uniform is a valuable source of income for the OPA (all monies raised through this are invested into school projects) and in these difficult financial times it is more important than ever. across many disciplines. A number of parents have asked about the Duke of Edinburgh Awards Scheme (D of E). This will return next year, more information will be available in the Autumn term.

Student Success

It has been a pleasure this year to receive students who have made exceptional progress in the classroom, overcome adversity or represented the school. It has been a delight to write home to over 150 families offering congratulations and recognising their child's endeavours at school. This is in addition to the certificates and prizes awarded at the end of term.

Public Finances and Academy application

The state of the public finances still causes concern in the public sector. Our application for Academy status has now been accepted by the Diocese and the DfE. At the time of writing we are on course for a September conversion, however, there are still a number of issues to be resolved. Despite the difficult financial situation we are progressing with an application to the DfE for additional money approximately £400K to improve Maths and Science facilities in school. This money is only available because the school can match the 10% contribution from parental donations to the Governors Fund. The Governors will donate up to an additional £200K to the project. **Thank you to all parents who have made this possible through their donations.**

The future

The Governors approved a substantial development plan for the school earlier this year. A number of key features include:

- *Improve sacramental literacy*
- *Ensure all students make the required level of progress in line with their potential*
- *Improve literacy and numeracy through all subjects*
- *Increase resources within our pastoral support framework*
- *Improve student management during semi and unstructured times*
- *Differentiation in home learning*
- *Further improvement in provision for Gifted and Talented students*
- *Develop new monitoring systems for the new Ofsted framework*

Phone or email school (absence@oaklands.hants.sch.uk) on the first day of an absence.

Respond quickly to text messages requesting confirmation of an absence. Send a note in with your child on their first day back after an absence, outlining the reason. Watch out for "patterns" of absence which might indicate a problem with a certain lesson and contact the Tutor right away to discuss further.

Attend the meetings requested by the Head of Year if your child is identified as a Persistent Absentee. Finally, be aware that research shows that an attendance rate of 90% is linked to a whole grade of underachievement at GCSE.

Feed back from Parents' Evenings

Over the course of the past academic year, we have been very pleased indeed with the attendance rates at Oaklands Parents' Evenings. There are no nationally published figures against which to compare our rates, but the detail is testament to the great support given by parents to the education of their children at Oaklands. Thank you to the parents who contacted the school before a Parents' Evening to say they were not able to attend. If these figures were taken into account in Years 7 to 11 all figures would be above 90%.

At two Parents Evenings we conducted surveys to gather the

opinions of parents and carers about the school. One key message that came through from the responses, was the feeling by some parents that communication between home and school is perhaps not as great as would be liked. In re-

sponse to this, we are undertaking a drive to gather as many e-mail addresses as possible with a target of covering 95% of families with e-mail communication for newsletters, letters to parents and announcements about events.

It is timely to remind parents that students' books form a main line of communication between teachers, students and parents to report on the progress and attainment secured by children over the course of the year. The book sharing weeks in the run up to Parents' Evenings are by no means the only times that parents can look at their child's work and progress and the exercise books can be used as a means of communication between home and school if any questions arise. Additionally, the Student Planner can be used for communication on pastoral matters, as it is one of the most direct means of contacting your child's tutor with a view to opening a dialogue on a particular matter.
